1	(Whereupon the hearing went on the
2	record at 7:42 p.m.)
3	MR. HERD KEALING: Stream flow. Here in the
4	Cowlitz 30 or 40 years ago they put in dams here, right?
5	Stream flow. They're worried about stream flow in the fall
6	for the salmon. Where do the salmon go? They don't go into
7	streams, they go into hatcheries. When they should have put
8	in ladders, they didn't put in ladders. Now, they're having
9	a problem with salmon. They don't have problems with stream
10	flow at all. It's the department of cash and buzzards
11	that's got the problems. That's all I have to say.
12	(Audience applauds.)
13	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. I have Dennis Schafer?
14	MR. DENNIS SCHAFER: I'll pass.
15	MS. JUDY BEITEL: I'll go to the next. Larry
16	Smith? I will call on everyone else who wants to testify
17	after I go through these cards, everyone will get an
18	opportunity.
19	MR. LARRY SMITH: Okay. I was with the
20	understanding that they were going to put water meters on
21	our wells. And I talked to Travis Burns. And Travis more
22	or less answered that that's not the case. But for some
23	reason I don't trust our Government. And basically (crowd
24	erupts in applause) I would like to see my children and
25	grandchildren's rights be preserved. And also our

1	constitutional rights of our property be preserved, and I
2	think it's being jeopardized. And that's basically what I
3	have to say. Thank you.
4	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Thank you. Okay, Ryan Wright?
5	MR. RYAN WRIGHT: Listen, I want some due
6	diligence here. I have got a couple questions before I can
7	form any comments.
8	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay, we'll come back to you.
9	Carl Holley?
10	MR. CARL HOLLEY: I just want to find out from
11	somebody, I got a telephone call today that said, hey,
12	they're having a meeting down at Morton High School. Now,
13	this thing says there's 37 people on this planning
14	commission, and in this paragraph it lists "representing a
15	wide variety of interests including counties, cities and
16	citizens." I'm listed No. 3 and I had to get a phone call
17	to notify me about the meeting. Not cool, not cool.
18	(Audience applauds.)
19	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Next one is Jeff Lee.
20	Here he comes.
21	MR. JEFF LEE: I haven't had a chance to research
22	the water flows and everything like everyone else. But
23	we're losing our rights by the minute, our property rights,
24	now our water rights, our rights to do anything, drive down
25	the road. It has to stop somewhere. That's all I have to

1	say. We have to stand up.
2	(Audience applauds.)
3	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Barbara Burton-Burres.
4	MS. BARBARA BURTON-BURRES: Burres.
5	I got a big long list here, but it's mostly
6	questions. I'm a Christmas tree farmer. Farming about 350
7	acres of Christmas trees in both the Tilton River and
8	Cowlitz River Valley, Bear Canyon Tree Farm. We're
9	actually when I took over the tree farm from my dad 20
10	years ago I wanted to get water rights, because, believe it
11	or not, we have trouble getting water. You can put a well
12	down 200 feet and you won't hit anything. So, we wanted to
13	capture one of those streams that flows forever like Baird
14	Creek. And they told me that I could not that it
15	wouldn't do a bit of good to apply for a water right because
16	they weren't processing them, they wouldn't allow it. They
17	wouldn't it wouldn't get anywhere.
18	So, I let themat wherever I called to get the
19	paperwork for the permitI let them talk me out of getting
20	a water right. But we use water without our well
21	wouldn't our well runs our house and that's it. So, I
22	want to know how can I operate my farm? And what are the
23	where am I going to get water if I don't already have a
24	homestead? How are we going to operate our farm and how are
25	my children going to my children are now in the business

1	and they want to branch out. And we're farmers, we want to
2	farm the land. We want to change our crops, we want to use
3	the land. The county has just done this huge plan that
4	limits what we can use our property for. Does this tie in
5	with that? Does this limiting the water use how can you
6	farm it if you can't get any new water? That's my concern.
7	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Thank you. (Audience applauds.)
8	Okay. The next one is Bill Meade?
9	MR. BILL MEADE: I'll pass.
10	MS. JUDY BEITEL: How about Richard Kain?
11	MR. RICHARD KAIN: My name is Richard Kain. I
12	live in Glenoma. I really would have liked to have heard
13	these other people tonight to hear what they had to say;
14	however, we're not going to get that chance. So, I'm going
15	to express how I really feel about this. I think one of the
16	issues you brought up is we need to know is this a state or
17	Federal law that we're jumping to? State or Federal, what's
18	the reason we're all dancing to this?
19	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah, what's the answer?
20	MS. JUDY BEITEL: If you could give your
21	testimony, and then we'll answer.
22	(Audience starts yelling and
23	hollering.)
24	MR. RICHARD KAIN: I think they'll answer it
25	pretty soon. We need to know that. And then from there if

it is a state law we know who to contact to change the damn law; right? Then they don't have to dance to it anymore.

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The next thing that bothers me a lot is I look at these packages and no matter what they're talking about for another meeting or what the issues are, but it says right here they're talking about the adoption date is the summer or fall of 2010. That's three weeks away, summer of 2010.

The other thing I want to bring up, maybe you guys ought to take a look in to, is I was aware quite some time ago that the State has systematically been washing out the water and mineral rights to our property when it changes hands over the last 15 years, or even longer than that.

When you sell your property you don't go through the same title search you used to before, the State is washing that out. For the very same reason, very same reason, that when you have your car and you think you own it with your title, you don't have a title, none of you here do. You have a certificate of title. The State keeps the title. Okay. Think about that.

We need to know if this is a State law and contact our representatives to change the damn law then they can move to a different action. If there's a lawsuit by the Sierra Club or whatever is generating them to move, let's change the damn law and nobody has to dance to that same little tune.

1	The next thing that bothers me a lot in here is
2	this plan that we're dancing to was developed through a
3	collaborative effort by the commissioners and other
4	representatives. Where did he go? (Audience starts
5	hollering.) In 2006, four years laterI know you weren't
6	there thenbut four years later we're just hearing about
7	this by a note in the where's Kathy, her big placard
8	hanging on her wall. This is sad, it's really, really sad.
9	(Audience applauds.)
10	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Toni Luond.
11	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Was it State or Federal, did you
12	ever answer that?
13	MS. JUDY BEITEL: We will answer questions after
14	the public comment. Toni, where's Toni? No Toni. How
15	about Norman McKnight? No, Norman McKnight. Okay, Judy
16	Otis?
17	MS. JUDY OTIS: I'm here, but I didn't check the
18	box.
19	MS. JUDY BEITEL: You filled out a card but you
20	don't want to, okay. Hall Beecher, do you want to provide
21	comment tonight?
22	MR. HALL BEECHER: It's already on the record from
23	last night.
24	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Now, I know you wanted to
25	so I'm going to go to her, and I'm going to go to all of you

1	who
2	AUDIENCE MEMBER: We did not see those cards to
3	fill out.
4	MS. JUDY BEITEL: I have some for you, so when you
5	come to testify I'll put your name on there.
6	Go ahead, ma'am, and state your name for the
7	record.
8	MS. LAVERNE TROXEL: Laverne Troxel, T-r-o-x-e-l.
9	I'm a resident of Randall. I lived in this community for 18
10	years. I'm basically going to state what practically
11	everybody else has stated. But this is the thing I don't
12	like that I see all over and over again not just with this
13	instance but with Government. We are being told tonight
14	they are not going to monitor our wells, they are not going
15	to do this to us, they are not going to do that to us. Oh,
16	yes, it's in the plan because someone else sued us, and we
17	have it in writing that we can do this to you, but we're not
18	going to. Do you trust that?
19	(The audience yells no.)
20	MS. LAVERNE TROXEL: I don't trust that at all
21	because over and over again dealing with Government,
22	Government lies. I'm sorry, I'm a good American citizen,
23	but we are witnessing here tonight we are witnessing
24	grass-roots freedom at its best with everybody standing up
25	for what they believe is right. And we don't have to put up

1 with this garbage. We may have to fight. We may have to 2 gather together and organize and do something about it. But 3 if they come in and decide to put meters on our wells, we 4 don't have to stand for it, that's taking away a basic 5 freedom. There's not a State in the Union that taxes 6 7 groceries or medicine because it is a necessity of life. You can live for a long time without food, but how long can 8 9 you go without water? What right do they have to tax our 10 water? And that's exactly what they're proposing. 11 And, I'm sorry, you are all caught in the middle. 12 You are employees, it's not your fault. But you're saying, 13 okay, we're not going to do this. There are people above 14 you that will turn around and say we don't care. They 15 haven't seen our faces, they don't know who we are. We are 16 nothing but a number to them. If they can generate a little 17 income, or whatever they want to, they will step all over us 18 if we don't stand up for our rights. We are losing our 19 rights to this country because people do not come to meetings like this like all of you here have done. And we 2.0 21 need to keep coming to meetings and we need to fight this 2.2 kind of crap. Sorry. (Audience applauds.) 2.3 24 MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Next we have Commissioner 25 Grose.

(Au	dience	keeps	talking.

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COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: Ladies and gentlemen, I taught school for 11 years, and I have a lot of patience, and if you don't want to sit and listen I can sit here all night and not say a word.

These people did come up here to try to explain this whole process and what's going on. And I'm not going to sympathize with this particular group, and I don't particularly support the rule as it has been written at this particular time. We have certain reservations, we have very definite reservations about some of the things that are in there. But you deserve to listen to what they have to say so that they will be able to make the presentation and you will be able to make some decisions, and some well informed decisions.

I've heard a lot of people say they didn't know about this and didn't know about it except from two days ago, and that may very well be true. It was advertised, it was put in the Journal, it was put in the Chronicle, as all legal documents were. (Audience starts yelling and hollering.) The same as any legal notice that goes in there, same thing.

Anyway, regardless these things are available to you, but by the testimony of the people that are here tonight the word got around. I know how the grape vine

1	works.
2	AUDIENCE MEMBER: It didn't work for you guys this
3	time.
4	COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: That's not true, we
5	wanted people to be here. I called people to get here. Ask
6	Larry. But we can't get anything done with everybody
7	talking at once. And this forum, quite frankly, doesn't
8	work because these people down here can't hear what people
9	are saying. And these people down here can't hear what's
10	being said down here. It's all mumble jumble. My hearing
11	is not all that great, and it's not working well.
12	A lot of people have had an opportunity to testify
13	and give your statements. I've been urged to say they're
14	going to postpone the hearing period for at least two weeks,
15	was going to be the 4th of Junethe end of the hearing
16	periodnow it's going to be two weeks past that which makes
17	it the 18th.
18	And they want to hear because we want to get this
19	stuff on the record. And this whole thing was suppose to be
20	where you have an opportunity to ask questions and then the
21	court reporter would come in and they would take testimony
22	for the record so that it's a physical record that has to be
23	part of the rule making process. We haven't really had the
24	opportunity to do that very well. And what's been suggested

to me is that we schedule another meeting, or two, so that

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1	people will have the opportunity, and we will have the
2	opportunity, to get the testimony in.
3	Now, I testified that we
4	(Audience all starts talking at once.)
5	I can't do this. I didn't speak when you were
6	speaking.
7	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I just would like a notice of
8	the meeting.
9	COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: Yeah, you'll get a notice
10	of the meeting.
11	AUDIENCE MEMBER: You'll mail one to us if our
12	address is on that paper?
13	COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: If you filled out a paper
14	with your address I will see that you get a notice of this
15	meeting. I will take care of that.
16	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Isn't that part of your job to
17	let us know?
18	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Can you let him finish his
19	comment, please?
20	COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: It's not necessarily part
21	of my job, but I will do it.
22	So, the idea is, and I don't know when these
23	meetings are going to be scheduled, you'll let me know as
24	soon as you find out. So, as soon as we find out when the
25	next meeting will be I will get letters to everyone in this

room who has signed up, and that should be enough. But we'll also put legal notices in the newspaper as we are required to do, as they're required to do.

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I testified last night in Longview on this issue, and I did not testify in favor of the rule. I have copies of what I read last night. We also have our attorneys working on this whole thing to see what the legal ramifications are for the county. But just to holler out stuff doesn't work. We need to be more orderly. We need to be able to come down so she can get testimony recorded. We need a forum where everybody can hear. And I don't know if the Morton High School gym is the best forum for us. We need to look at where we can go and what we can do to make this more meaningful for everybody involved, including myself, because it's not been meaningful for me tonight.

I will say that there was some issues raised last night with regard to this plan. And this is the plan to which everyone is referring, it's this document here. And where can we make copies, Travis? Do you know? Where can — because somebody asked me.

MR. TRAVIS BURNS: They're available on the web.

You can find it. We'll make it even more easier to connect
to. It's on the website that's available on the board over
there. If you get an opportunity jot down that information,
that will give you more information on the Internet and

phone numbers that you can use to get more information.
AUDIENCE MEMBER: What was the meeting last night
you guys are referring to?
COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: Exactly the same thing,
same meeting, same forum. It was just a smaller group so we
could present it in a little bit better fashion, people
could hear and it was a smaller meeting.
AUDIENCE MEMBER: So, next time you have a meeting
you'll come prepared?
MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay.
COMMISSIONER LEE GROSE: Just a minute, I'm not
quite done.
I inherited this job to work on thisnot this
plan, but these rules that we're looking at tonightwhen I
took office. And I'm going to confess that it wasn't taken
very serious at the time when I first took office because I
didn't really have a clue what it was about. As time went
on I recognized that it was very serious and I started
making sure it was on my schedule every time they met.
Sometimes I couldn't make the meetings because I had other
obligations, most of the time I had been there.
I want to say that we all have a certain amount of
distrust for Government, myself included. But I do want to
say that Travis and Scott have been very good about
listening to what I have to say and what our staff had to

say and their input into this document.

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Now having said that, last night we discovered some flaws that were in here. And those are things we need to have addressed, we haven't had them addressed yet. So, we're going to take a look at that. They're going to take a look at that and try to make some changes in the document to make sense. Whether that has anything to do with metering wells or not I won't say because I don't know. But we're going to try to make the document so it works.

This rule when it takes affect is going to be part of the Washington Administrative Code, so it's part of the law that has to be followed. And it's part of the law that I swore when I took office that I will uphold. I don't take that responsibility lightly. When I put my hand on that Bible and said I withhold the laws of the State of Washington and the Federal Constitution I mean it. And, so, this law has to be dependable by me as your representative. And if it's not I don't feel very comfortable with it.

Having said all that I want to say that they're going to set up another meeting, or two, and get it in a forum where we can actually hear each other speak and then do this thing right so we have your testimony and everything on record adequately. Okay.

You want to dismiss or what do you want to do?

MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. First of all, I would

1	like to let you know that public notice of this hearing was
2	published in seven newspapers, the Longview Daily News, The
3	News Tribune, the Wahkiakum County Eagle, the Skamania.
4	(Audience starts yelling and
5	hollering.)
6	AUDIENCE MEMBER: That's not our county. We don't
7	get any of those.
8	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Let me finish. Skamania. Did I
9	say Longview Daily News? That one. The Chronicle and the
10	Willapa Harbor Herold, Lewis County Chronicle. So, notice
11	was published on May 12th and May 19th. So, you can go
12	back, get those. You have a copy right here of what?
13	AUDIENCE MEMBER: How come it wasn't published in
14	the Morton Journal?
15	MS. JUDY BEITEL: It was published in the Lewis
16	County paper.
17	AUDIENCE MEMBER: But if you are having a hearing
18	in Morton
19	MS. JUDY BEITEL: I'll remember that the next
20	time. On the 12th and the 19th. And also notice of this
21	hearing went out to over 600 interested parties listed, so
22	that happened, as well.
23	(Interruption as notice is given that
24	someone left their lights on.)
25	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. I'm going to let him come

1	up and make a comment. And then staff are going to stay,
2	I'm going to close out this and then we are going to stay
3	here for as long as it takes and we're going to answer these
4	questions and do you have a comment?
5	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes.
6	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay, come on down. And then
7	we're going to close this out and we're going to stay here
8	as long as it takes to answer these questions.
9	(Some of the audience starts talking
10	and gets up to leave.)
11	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Listen. Nobody can hear. Let
12	him make his comment, please. State your name for the
13	record.
14	MR. JOHN URBAS: My name is John Urbas. I'm from
14 15	MR. JOHN URBAS: My name is John Urbas. I'm from Randall, Washington. My comment, if these people really
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15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23	Randall, Washington. My comment, if these people really want to let you people know when meetings are going to happen let's do it like when one of us dies. There's a big paper sitting on the front door of the grocery stores, pharmacies, the post office and, by golly, that spreads like wildfire through the community. If you want to really have us at your meetings advertise there. You may legally have to have it there, but if you want results that's where you should advertise.

1	volunteer to post it everywhere where everybody will see it
2	in the community.
3	(Everyone starts talking and Judy tries
4	to get everyone under control.)
5	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Go ahead. State your name for
6	the record.
7	MS. ANDREA MAY: My name is Andrea May from
8	Packwood.
9	There are a couple of things I wanted to say, but
10	I think I have to narrow it down a little bit further. Any
11	time that there's a forum here in which our voices can be
12	heard it's a good thing, opposite of what Lee Grose just
13	said, although I understand what Lee Grose meant. So, this
14	is a good forum to be heard.
15	This, to me, this water appreciation party here,
16	for those behind us, is like a gigantic and I didn't
17	think about this until I was sitting down, a gigantic,
18	gigantic cow pie that's been flatulated over the heads of
19	all of us. I'm a property owner with my husband, I have
20	been a property owner here for very many years. I'm not so
21	much concerned about my water, but that doesn't matter. I
22	need to be concerned as an independent Christian
23	conservative for my neighbors who move in, and they may not
24	have a lot of money, they may only be able to buy half an
25	acre, maybe they can buy 15 acres, I don't know. But they

come after me, they come after me and they are the ones that have the property. So, we're suppose to be satisfied with that? I'm not. I'm an independent thinker and therefore I'm concerned about the neighbors who can't afford this, shouldn't afford it and we shouldn't be here talking about it.

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So, the other issue I have is that let's go back clear up to Canada and let's start down the Colorado, let's start down the Columbia and take all of these big businesses, put them together, shake them all up in a can and come out the same way every time. They have their attorneys, attorneys, attorneys that vouch for their dumpage, their sewer, their chemicals into our rivers and our subsidiaries.

And then we're turning around and we're being taxed and we're duped and we're being fooled into thinking it's only just for putting a meter on our wells. I don't want a meter on anybody's well, and I certainly don't want a meter on someone that comes after me, because I have a heartfelt appreciation of what it's like to see a friend or to see a family member or see all the animals that get diseased from the chemicals, that get cancer and die. Those are just the animals. Let's take the people all along these rivers and their subsidiaries.

So, this isn't just an issue of a well here that

1	we're looking at. We don't have umpteen attorneys standing
2	right here unless they're secretly hidden around or behind
3	the door here. So, we're not getting any answers. The
4	other gentleman that says we need to pay attention, we
5	absolutely do because I don't trust the Government either.
6	But I have more faith in people like you that are
7	hardworking and know what it's like to have to spend a
8	nickel and a dime or a dollar or even rub two nickels
9	together and get no place and then have to turn around and
10	spend it on a meter. So, I say we need to get with it here
11	because something has gone awry and they are not helping.
12	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Thank you.
13	(Audience applauds.)
14	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Go ahead. State your name for
15	the record.
16	MR. DENNIS HADALLER: I'm Dennis Hadaller. I was
17	third district commissioner from 1999 through 2006. I was
18	involved in the Cowlitz Basin Watershed Plan 25
19	& 26. I see Ecology has a different plan than what we
20	developed, it took us approximately two or three years, Jeff
21	here from the Salmon Recovery Board was at those meetings.
22	There is a surplus of water somehow below the dam, above the
23	dams there is a shortage they say. Are they taking into
24	consideration all the forest service land? Are they taking
25	in all the roofs on the houses where the water is put back

1	into the ground? It's not used. Normal house should get
2	400 and some gallons a day for usage. The average usage is
3	about 240 gallons. So, we're getting shortchanged here,
4	folks.
5	And I heard it said that it happened while I was
6	on watch. And I disagree with whoever said it happened on
7	my watch. You ask Jeff how hard I fought down at Longview,
8	and I got in there that you could move water rights above
9	the dam, up the river. Before you could only move them
10	down. That was in the Cowlitz Basin Plan.
11	So, folks, I guess I've got to tell you, I have a
12	lawsuit right now over land use against Lewis County.
13	That's the reason I didn't run for a third term.
14	(Audience applauds.)
15	MR. DENNIS HADALLER: I don't think you folks, or
16	myself included, should have to go out and hire these high
17	priced law firms to defend an action where the growth board,
18	the Lewis County Planning Commission, can take your land
19	from you and tell you what you can do. I was born and
20	raised here and come luckily in October I've been here 83
21	years.
22	(Audience applauds.)
23	MR. DENNIS HADALLER: And, so, my family was a
24	pioneer family here, come here in early 1900's. Just before
25	Highway 12 was just a mud road my dad drove a team up and

1	down that. So, I just want to say, folks, we've got to take
2	back our county. And, so, please, please write a letter,
3	even if it's in handwriting, to these people. And I'm
4	sorry, about the interruption.
5	MS. JUDY BEITEL: That's okay, you can just fill
6	that out for me.
7	(Audience applauds.)
8	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Go ahead. And like I said, I
9	think these people are in line to comment, and then we're
10	going to stop and start all over with questions again
11	because I know you guys still have questions you want to
12	ask. And we're going to stay here and get to the
13	nitty-gritty and get these questions answered. So, go
14	ahead, sir, state your name for the record.
15	MR. CURTIS HEDLUND: Curtis Hedlund. Does anybody
16	know what a corporation is? Does everybody know what a
17	corporation is? The State is a corporation. How much
18	jurisdiction does a corporation have? None. That's one
19	question.
20	No. 2 question. Mr. Lee Grose knew about this,
21	and he's waiting until election time to say, I'm sorry, but
22	I had other stuff to do. And he's a good man, but I feel he
23	let us down. Maybe not, but I think he did. I think that
24	he should have been honest to let everybody know until last
25	minute. I mean we're down to the wire and trying to get

everybody together. Cookie and me and other people worked on Watch Mountain, Cookie went back. This is off the record. Cookie went back and we won that. So, if everybody could pull together we could win this.

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MS. JUDY BEITEL: Thank you. Could you fill this out with your name? Go ahead. State your name for the record, please.

MR. JAC WOXSON: My name is Jac Woxson. I'd like to comment on what this person said. If you're going to battle these people what you have to do, you have to know the nature of the beast that you're fighting. And since 1933 we have been under what you call public policy and not public law. The constitution basically is suspended. What you're dealing with is corporations. And for them to have any power over you they must have a contract with you. And I put a legal notice in the Morton Journal today. If you want to read it it will give you some kind of an idea of how we can fight it.

authority over you, and they don't, you just let them by default. So, you have to fight back, but you have to know what you're fighting. The county is a municipal corporation, it's a commercial corporation. They're in there to make money basically. The State is the corporation and the Federal Government is the corporation. You go to

Delaware where all the corporations are filed and you'll find that out.

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The other thing they're not telling you is they're always whining about having a budget shortfall. Well, guess what? You're going to have a budget shortfall and have billions of dollars stashed away in another place. You get on the Internet and type in CAFR, that's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. And I'm not good enough to dig it out, but I do know that in 2003 if you got any idea how much money the State of Washington had? And that's not counting the counties. You have any idea how much money they had? Try 20.8 billion stashed away in different places invested. If they had given that back to the people it would have been 3,300 and some dollars to every man, woman and child, that's our money. And they have that money and they're whining that they want more all the time and more control. Okay. So, we have to learn how to fight them. And there's a wealth of information out there on the Internet if you want to look for it.

But I have a legal notice in the Morton Journal today, and I had it notarized, and I made it a matter of public record down at the courthouse. And I sent some men to the building people down there, you know, that tell you you have to have a permit for this and permit for that, and I sent one to them. And if they try to force me to get a

building permit, it's under Title 18 of the Criminal Code, 1 2 they're trying to force them to contract with them. 3 Everything you do is with contracts with Government now. 4 It's contract. And if you don't want to do what they want 5 don't contract with them. See? Just like I explained to 6 the idiot that come up there wanting me to get a permit for the building I was building. I said, I don't have a 7 license, contractor's license, I'm not getting a permit. 8 9 Okay. But it's all contract and you have to learn 10 what's going on and understand the nature of the beast that 11 you're fighting. And there's a wealth of information out 12 there on the Internet. Type in CAFR, it will give you a big 1.3 surprise, that's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, and 14 they never tell you about this. You can have a budget 15 shortfall and still have billions of dollars in their own 16 little coffers they're not telling you about. If they had 17 given that back to people, whose money it really is, it 18 would have created some like 75,000 new jobs. And the money 19 and taxes they would have accrued from it would have been 2.0 more than that money all combined. They would have made 21 money on that, but they didn't. 2.2 One thing is stuck in my mind is it'll give you 23 the different money accounts that are put into, you know, 24 they're building a new school up there that we don't need, 25 but in their school building fund for the State in that year

1 was 985 million. Try that. Get in there and see what kind 2 of a deal you're -- beast that you're fighting. 3 MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Go ahead and state your 4 name for the record so she can get it. 5 (Audience applauds.) 6 MR. VIC KNVOROFF: My name is Vic Knvoroff. I'm 7 from Randall, Washington. And I've ranched there for 20 some years. If this proposal by the Department of Ecology, 8 9 Washington Administrative Code 173-526-010, is allowed to be 10 adopted as written, of which this hearing is all about it, 11 will effectively link watershed planning, which is found in 12 RCW 90.82, with monitoring and the metering of water use, 1.3 which is Washington Administrative Code 173-173. 14 Traditionally the monitoring and metering of water use in 15 Washington Administrative Code 173-173 was designed for 16 commercial water rights, of which the Title Chapter 90 is 17 labeled water rights. Hence the chapter title itself does 18 not indicate that the metering of domestic use is included. 19 The metering of water use was originally intended 2.0 for water right users on a commercial scale, and primarily 21 for those using it for agricultural purposes where water was 22 scarce and in limited supply. Furthermore, it was 2.3 originally intended to regulate just surface waters. 24 designed to assure each user received their share. Water 25 metering was not originally developed for water users for

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This WAC, Washington Administrative Code

173-526-010, does not meet the original intent of WAC

173-173 when it was adopted and written. However, at some time in the past, in response to irrigating agricultural land with ground water, primarily on the east side,

Washington Administrative Code 173-173-040 was amended to address the use of ground water for agricultural purposes.

And, so, water rights to ground water was initiated.

Now the Department of Ecology wants to extend or be able to extend the requirements of commercial users to domestic users. Washington Administrative Code 173-173-040(2C) states, "the Department must enforce the requirement to measure water use for the following types of water use: New and existing ground water rights where the Department concludes that the withdrawal of any volume," that is any volume, "of water may affect surface waters containing depressed or critical salmonoid stock." Apparently the Department of Ecology wishes to treat domestic use as commercial use.

And that WAC 173-526-010 will do just that, treating domestic water use as a water right is what we're going towards. And metering will allow them to do it as a possible revenue source for the State but at additional cost to the domestic user no matter how you look at it.

2	MS. JUDY BEITEL: State your name for the record.
3	MR. DENNIS SCHAFER: My name is Dennis Schafer.
4	In what he was just reading it says if you go if you read
5	further on, if you don't cooperate you're a criminal. They
6	will pass criminal charges against you. That's in black and
7	white. And I, for one, I don't know who else around here
8	is, but I'm tired of this garbage. I'm for taking up arms
9	if they keep going any further. You know, Government is
10	pushing too much. They push a little bit, little bit,
11	little bit. They stuff it down your throat a little bit at
12	a time and get you to take it.
13	But what happened back in the old days? We had
14	civil wars. We had the Boston Tea Party. And I'm just
15	tired of it, and I'll be the first one to stand in line with
16	a gun.
17	(Audience applauds and hollers.)
18	MS. JUDY BEITEL: Okay. Now, I'm going to say
19	this hearing is adjourned at 8:32 p.m. And thank you for
20	coming tonight. There is staff that are going to stay here
21	to talk with you one-on-one. We are coming back, and we're
22	setting up more hearings and more question and answer
23	sessions. So, tonight is not the last time you're going to
24	be able to get your questions answered, but feel free to
25	stay around if you want to talk to staff one-on-one. Thank

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you. Thank you for coming.
